## The "Snow Day" Decision

What goes into the decision to call off school, release early or start late. A "snow day" is a relative term as we have canceled for extreme cold, ice, and we even canceled a day two years ago for extreme wind. How do I come to this decision? There are many moving and intertwining parts. I will try and walk you through the process.

There are many more scenarios that could be played out here, but this is a snapshot of what goes into the decision. At the end of the day, it is about getting students and staff home or here safely. This decision is never made lightly. So, as we enter February, it is my hope we are done with making "snow day" decisions. (But probably not)

1. Local news channels will issue a weather alert day or notices for extreme weather. You are now put on

2. If the inclement weather develops, superintendents and other local officials are contacted by the National Weather Service (NWS). Twenty-four to thirty-six hours ahead of the storm they will begin sending out powerpoint updates every four to six hours. It just depends on the severity. If severity increases, they will

Armed with this information it becomes a waiting game of sorts. Surrounding superintendents are in direct contact with each other and relay thoughts on what they may decide. Two scenarios develop at this point based on the confidence of the NWS predictions. If confidence is high and the storm is tracking, you will see schools cancel early. If confidence is not as strong you will see superintendents delay to see what develops. There is a domino effect as well. Once a school cancels and then another you will start to see more go. I am on a thread with seven other surrounding superintendents, some of those are on threads with with schools closer to them. Communication happens well into the night and into the early morning. I

4. Keep in mind some schools don't do a late start. Other schools are locked into contracts with bus companies

5. In-district information comes from the head maintenance person and me, who each drive the roads to get an idea of conditions. This happens usually between 11 p.m. and 4:30 a.m. depending on the timing of the storm. We are also in contact with the county to get their view on the roads, especially the gravel roads.

## **Bus Behaviors & Expectations**

• The expectation on the bus is students must remain seated and keep aisles and exits clear while the vehicle is moving; are prohibited from throwing or passing objects on, from, or into vehicles; not be loud or boisterous; avoid talking to the driver while the vehicle is in motion. We encourage frequentl reviews of these expectations with students at home to ensure the safety of our all students while riding the bus. •You can also help keep our students safe by ensuring students get in and out of vehicles on the curbside. Please remind your child to utilize the side of the vehicle that is closest to the school sidewalk when entering or exiting a vehicle.

• Morning breakfast ends at 8:00 am.
